3 Steps to See the Invisible

"Moses kept right on going because he kept his eyes on the one who is invisible" Hebrews 11:27 (NLT)

I'm sure you've had an eye exam. One eye covered, the doctor asks you to move down the rows on the chart, trying to figure out at what level things get blurry. When my brother was in elementary school, my mom took him in for an exam based on a comment his teacher had made. Starting at the top, squinting hard, he says "I think it's an E." Needless to say he has been wearing glasses ever since. He knew there was a letter there, and he wanted badly to see it, but his eyes were of little help. May as well have been invisible! Made me appreciate the disconnect in this verse from Hebrews when I read it the other day.

How can you keep your eyes on something invisible?

What a crazy verse! Yet intuitively it makes sense to me. Such a bold statement of faith. I get it. My brother knew the E was there, and he wanted to see it, but his eyes were limiting his ability to see it. Of course I want to keep my eyes on God though sometimes I feel like my brother when I speak of God. My faith makes me believe he's there but find myself saying "I think I see him."

Made me wonder if the writer meant this figuratively: "Maybe I can keep the eyes of my heart on God? Or the eyes of my soul? Or even the eyes of my entire being?" All good thoughts, but I just kept feeling that it was not quite the whole picture. What steps do I take to see God, invisible?

I thought about my brother's eye exam again, squinting so hard to see that E. Now that I'm older and wear glasses sometimes, I have a whole new appreciation for what he must have felt like back then. The other day I was trying to sign-up to see a show on my TV. Not wearing my glasses, I found myself squinting hard trying to see the numbers as I typed my email address in. Finally, I moved closer to the screen so I could see. I didn't need to squint so much anymore. What had been just a blur, was now clearer.

Squinting helped some. Moving closer really helped a lot.

When I was squinting I could feel my level of concentration ramping up. I was trying harder. Squinting seems to be a key piece of seeing things better. I really wanted to see so I looked harder. In the midst of squinting, it seems like more than our eyes comes into play; a combination of mind and eyes. The verb "eyes" means "with interest". When I squint, I engage my mind and eyes, interested.

Step 1: Squint when trying to see God.

I've been reading through Exodus recently. One of the centerpieces is the Tent of Meeting. Moses would go inside and meet with God.

"Inside the Tent of Meeting, the Lord would speak to Moses face to face, as one speaks to a friend." Exodus 33:11a (NLT)

Moses made an effort to move closer to God to see him in intimacy ("face to face") much like me moving closer to the TV screen. Moses had a history of moving closer to see God. He saw a bush on fire. It was not burning up so he went closer to see and he met God. He scaled the mountain to go see God, spending incredible amounts of time with him there. Each time he made the effort to get a better vantage point. Each time deepening his intimacy with God. Moses is a great example for us.

Step 2: Make an effort to move closer to see God.

Moses did not stop trying to get a better view. As he moved closer and closer he wanted to see more of God. Emboldened by deep intimacy created by their time together, he made a big ask:

¹⁷ The Lord replied to Moses, "I will indeed do what you have asked, for I look favorably on you, and I know you by name."

¹⁸ Moses responded, "Then show me your glorious presence."

*¹⁹ The Lord replied, "I will make all my goodness pass before you, and I will call out my name, Yahweh, before you. For I will show mercy to anyone I choose, and I will show compassion to anyone I choose. ²⁰ But you may not look directly at my face, for no one may see me and live." ²¹ The Lord continued, "Look, stand near me on this rock. ²² As my glorious presence passes by, I will hide you in the crevice of the rock and cover you with my hand until I have passed by. ²³ Then I will remove my hand and let you see me from behind. But my face will not be seen."
*Exodus 33:17-23 (NLT)**

Moses learned the character and deep love of God by meeting with him regularly, sometimes over long stretches while praying and fasting. He noticed God at work. He listened and obeyed. He came to know the awesome power of God, but also his loving intimate nature. His hunger now so strong, he had to ask no matter the consequences, and God showed himself to him. Knowing that his glorious

presence is too overwhelming, he reveals his backside, allowing us to follow him as we venture forward on our journey here.

Step 3: From a place of intimacy, boldly ask God to show himself to you.

Moses' eyes were locked on God and he kept on going. I imagine that each morning when he woke, his eyes freshly opened, he would squint to set his gaze on God. Then he would begin moving toward him, devoting himself to God, building intimacy so he could boldly ask God to show himself that day. Such a powerful image for us as we go out each day in pursuit of our Life Missions.
